Yom Kippur on the horizon, sirens in the south: endgame talks, hard doctrine, and the duty to stay awake

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Opening

THE publication notes it will not issue a briefing on Yom Kippur, which begins this evening. Sirens sounded near Gaza approximately twenty minutes before publication, with the IDF intercepting two missiles from Gaza City. No emergency calls were reported by Magen David Adom.

The briefing highlights key developments: the timeline on a U.S.-backed ceasefire as Hamas signals rejection, the IDF's strategy during "twilight days" and emphasis on maintaining ground inside Gaza rather than retreating, fresh Palestinian terrorism in Judea, and expanding pressure from Tehran's proxy forces toward European capitals.

The War Today

IDF Braces for 'Twilight Days' of Gaza War

IDF Chief of Staff Lt. Gen. Eyal Zamir toured Gaza, warning commanders that Hamas may launch final attacks before a potential U.S.-brokered ceasefire. The Trump–Netanyahu plan calls for full hostage release in exchange for prisoner swaps and Hamas disarmament, with international monitors overseeing tunnel and weapons destruction. Hamas leaders rejected the terms, while hostage families praised the announcement.

IDF Commanders Warn: Hold Ground Inside Gaza

Senior Southern Command officers cautioned that leaving the IDF only at the border would recreate October 6 vulnerabilities. They emphasized that border communities require visible Israeli military presence rather than Hamas gunmen, and advocated for a permanent security perimeter modeled on Lebanon arrangements. Officers argued the current Gaza City approach could dismantle Hamas infrastructure within two months.

Terror Attack in Gush Etzion

A terrorist rammed a vehicle into Israelis at Al-Khader Junction and attempted stabbing. Two teenagers aged 15 and 16 were injured, one seriously. A civilian, identified as Col. (res.) Hezi Nechama, shot the attacker. This incident reflects "the unbroken wave of Palestinian terrorism across Judea and Samaria."

Inside Israel

Knesset Confrontation Over Attorney General

Attorney General Gali Baharav-Miara faced accusations in the Knesset Constitution, Law and Justice Committee from coalition members including Religious Zionism MK Simcha Rothman and Likud MK Moshe Saada. They accused her of “lying, political bias, and betrayal” regarding IDF abuse investigations. Opposition members denounced the session as chaotic.

Archaeological Site Protection

Israeli forces and the Guardians of Eternity halted Palestinian Authority concrete-pouring at the ancient city of Gibeon, a biblical site associated with Joshua, King Saul, and Benjamite priestly cities. Officials characterized this as deliberate heritage erasure and called for extended Antiquities Authority jurisdiction across Judea and Samaria.

Education Ministry School Tours Policy

Education Minister Yoav Kisch rejected a *Haaretz* editorial opposing fully-funded school tours in Judea and Samaria. He stated Israeli students will study Torah, national heroes, and Jewish heritage across the land, with the ministry covering security costs for buses.

Israel and the World

Hamas Likely to Reject Trump’s Plan

A senior Hamas official told the BBC the group would reject President Trump’s 20-point ceasefire proposal, calling it biased toward Israel and refusing disarmament, immediate hostage release, or international stabilization forces. Qatar’s prime minister warned this represented the best available deal, while Trump pledged full U.S. backing for Israel to destroy Hamas if refused.

ICC Genocide Complaint Against Iran Leadership

Two American lawyers filed an ICC case accusing Iran’s Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei and IRGC commander Esmail Qaani of genocide, war crimes, and crimes against humanity for directing and arming Hamas before October 7. The complaint, filed on behalf of Bibas family relatives, argues Tehran’s annihilation calls and direct Hamas sponsorship meet genocide legal standards.

Syrian Druze Shift Toward Israel

Following summer massacres of Druze civilians in Sweida, local leaders established de facto military and governing structures, calling for autonomy from Damascus. Sheikh Hikmat al-Hijri thanked Israel for strikes forcing regime withdrawal, while Druze residents increasingly display Israeli flags. This represents a dramatic departure from century-long Syrian Druze political patterns.

Briefly Noted

- A Hamas operative posed as a hostage waving a white flag attempting to lure IDF troops, reviving memories of December 2023 friendly-fire killing of three actual hostages.
- Israeli envoy Danny Danon told the U.N. Security Council that Hamas manufactures rockets in Judea and Samaria, accusing the PA of paying “blood money” to terrorists.
- IDF commandos in Gaza City discovered a major Hamas weapons cache containing vests, grenades, maps, and surveillance equipment in hastily abandoned compounds.
- European pressure intensifies through protests, boycotts, and sanctions discussions as Italy signals openness to penalties and Germany wavers; Israel’s primary trading partner bloc is deteriorating.
- Israeli and American leaders warned at a New York assembly that Israel is losing the “eighth front”—the information war—calling for major investment countering propaganda fueling antisemitism.
- A joint report documented nearly 680,000 antisemitic posts on X in one year, viewed 193 million times, highlighting platform failures and extremist influencer monetization.
- Elon Musk escalated his ADL feud, calling it a “hate group that hates Christians,” after it flagged white supremacist theology as extremist; the ADL dismissed this as offensive and false.
- A Gaza flotilla serves “spectacle, not aid”—organizers pre-recorded kidnapping claims, disabled phones blocking evidence, and rejected viable aid routes, with Israel asserting Hamas orchestrates the operation.
- French MP Thomas Portes faces a prosecutor complaint for possible “glorification of terrorism” after meeting PFLP leaders in Beirut, including convicted terrorists, despite EU terror designation.
- Agriculture Minister Avi Dichter stated Hamas unlikely accepts Trump’s plan, but argued refusal would grant Israel international legitimacy to pursue military objectives.
- Two Syracuse University students accused of throwing pork into a Jewish fraternity during Rosh Hashanah waived preliminary hearings; the hate crime case proceeds to grand jury.
- French investigators uncovered disturbing online communities where young men consume neo-Nazi content, child sexual abuse material, and extreme gore, highlighting U.S.-originating digital radicalization linked to violent crime.
- South Africa’s ambassador to France, Nkosinathi Emmanuel Mthethwa, was found dead after falling from a 22nd-floor Paris hotel; French authorities investigate as suicide.

- Tel Aviv stocks reached record highs following Trump's Gaza peace plan announcement, with the TA-125 rising 3.1% and the shekel strengthening as investors bet on regional stability.

Developments to Watch

- **Beitunia terror cell raid:** IDF, ISA, and Border Police dismantled a Hamas-linked weapons workshop, seizing 15 rockets in production stages, firearms, and explosives. Officials called it “major attack infrastructure” prevention. *Likely to escalate.*
- **Iran-linked espionage arrests:** Shin Bet arrested two Holon residents suspected of Iranian intelligence spying. One allegedly photographed military bases while recruiting others; both reportedly worked for payment. *Likely to escalate.*
- **Iran executes alleged Mossad spy:** Tehran announced execution of Bahman Choobi-Asl, a database engineer accused of being among Mossad's top agents inside Iran, with access to government telecom systems.
- **U.S. fighter jets surge:** Dozens of American warplanes and aerial tankers deployed across the Middle East. Pentagon cites Houthi and Iraq surveillance; analysts suggest rapid-reaction posture against Iran. *Likely to escalate.*
- **Iraq militias threaten Israel:** A senior Iraqi source warned pro-Iranian militias would join any Israel-Iran conflict, boasting weapons “surpassing” Iraq's military arsenal.
- **Houthi threats shift:** The Houthis declared targeting U.S. oil tankers including ExxonMobil and Chevron vessels, despite earlier Washington truce. *Likely to escalate.*
- **Lebanon army pressures Hezbollah:** Lebanese forces began limited operations against Hezbollah, reportedly dismantling small arms caches in unprecedented military action.
- **Turkey eyes flotilla role:** Turkey's defense ministry stated naval vessels stand ready supporting Gaza flotillas with “humanitarian” escorts and search-and-rescue aid, raising sea-clash concerns.
- **Uman pilgrims stranded:** Hundreds of Israelis remain stuck in Moldova following mass flight cancellations, depending on Chabad for food and lodging through Yom Kippur.
- **Overcrowding at Selichot:** Jerusalem police blocked Old City entry after Kotel throngs created dangerous crush conditions; youths scaled walls to enter.
- **GPS disruptions:** Northwest Israel residents reported GPS jamming, likely military-related.

- **Syrian media fakery:** Syrian outlets published AI-generated “photos” of supposed IDF arrests of Syrian officers in Daraa; the IDF denied any operation occurred.

Closing Analysis

ISRAEL prepares for dual outcomes: either a deal securing every hostage's release and rapid stabilization, or renewed Hamas elimination efforts with full U.S. backing. Military commanders are direct: “a perimeter inside Gaza beats nostalgia for October 6.” Judea and Samaria continue experiencing terrorism. Internationally, lawfare constrains Iran's activities, Europe falters, and the flotilla industry rehearses media scripts.

Between fasting and prayer, stay situationally aware. Keep an eye on Hamas's answer window, IDF posture around Gaza City, and axis noise from Yemen, Iraq, and Lebanon.
