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The War Today

Israel Holds The North At “Ready,” Not “Quiet”

The IDF eliminated a Hezbollah operative in Jouaiyya—the second in as many days—as punishment for openly rebuilding terrorist infrastructure. Netanyahu held a closed security cabinet session after his Trump meeting to secure operational freedom and review Lebanon contingencies while monitoring Iranian instability. The danger isn’t Hezbollah strength but mutual suspicion between both sides, where each assumes the other might strike first. Lebanon’s military continues issuing statements claiming areas are disarmed while Israel keeps discovering armed terrorists and infrastructure exactly where those declarations claim they don’t exist.

ASSESSMENT

Israel’s northern stance focuses on whether Hezbollah requires a “manageable” incident to reassert deterrence before Israel’s broader action arrives. Iranian internal stress heightens this risk, as regimes under pressure often export fear through their most convenient proxy. Lebanon’s “disarmed south” statements are counterproductive because they encourage the international community to demand Israeli restraint based on fantasy rather than reality.

Gaza “Phase Two” Advances On Paper While Hamas Collects Cash

Hamas fired on IDF troops in the northern Strip—violating ceasefire terms—resulting in a targeted IDF-Shin Bet strike on a Hamas operative orchestrating attacks. Simultaneously, Hamas maintains financial vitality through the aid infrastructure meant to stabilize Gaza. Security assessments describe hundreds of millions of shekels in cash within Gaza, sustained through taxation

of incoming goods, layered fees, exchange rackets, and black-market control points. The Zeitoun search for Ran Gvili's remains resumed with coordination among Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and the Red Cross. Washington pursues next-stage governance frameworks while Israel insists no transition occurs without Hamas disarmament and Ran's return. Israel also supports controlled fragmentation: an anti-Hamas militia in Rafah claimed it eliminated two Hamas operatives and detained a third, highlighting emerging clan pressure on Hamas.

ASSESSMENT

Gaza exemplifies global confusion between inputs and outcomes. Trucks enter, Hamas taxes them. Committees form, Hamas installs members with "technocratic" titles. Foreigners promise gradual disarmament, Hamas retains weapons. A ceasefire where Hamas shoots troops isn't a ceasefire. The pattern teaches Hamas that leverage works. Removing Hamas requires stripping its cashflow, weapons, and monopoly on coercion.

Infiltration Attempts And Barrier Work Signal The Next Contact Surface

IDF forces detained over 20 infiltrators near Tarqumiya crossing after a mass infiltration attempt, alongside enforcement operations catching illegal entrants hidden in a Hadera sewage line. The Defense Ministry expanded eastern border security barrier work and began controlled destruction of legacy minefields along the Jordan border—hundreds of anti-tank mines cleared in recent operations. This multi-layered barrier project spans hundreds of kilometers, tied to a security concept establishing a new regional division for the Jordan Valley and surrounding areas.

ASSESSMENT

Israel repeatedly relearns hard lessons about state control. The frontline determines where state authority weakens—not just where rockets land. Minefields cleared today date from the late 1960s, yet the lesson remains current. Without maintained control over entry points, weapon movement, and force response speed, every other front becomes costlier.

Inside Israel

Growth Concentrates, Politics Argue Distribution

Israel's economy sends mixed signals. High-tech hiring stabilized and surged at senior levels—with AI premium pushing average salaries toward NIS 40,000 and senior roles into six figures. The Knesset took the unusual step of moving to override the finance minister's expanded VAT exemption on personal imports—pitting cost-of-living concerns against local industry protection as coalition partners divided. Farmers protested parallel deregulation moves threatening peripheral production.

ASSESSMENT

War economies don't distribute gains evenly, and denying this breeds backlash. The AI boom is genuine and strategic; so is the danger of hollowing local production while subsidizing imports. The VAT fight reflects timing rather than ideology—structural reforms during continued mobilization (after over two years) invites resistance. The government needs coherence protecting strategic sectors, honestly pricing security externalities, and ending economic policy improvisation as retail politics.

Home Front As Front Line, Civilian Muscle Rebuilt

The IDF chief framed the next conflict around surprise and civilian resilience, elevating municipalities from “support” to operational partners after lessons from both October 7 and summer Iranian operations. Nationwide distribution of standardized Arad rifles with advanced optics to civilian rapid-response teams and expanded Home Front Command coordination with local leaders improve readiness.

ASSESSMENT

Israel institutionalizes the lesson that civilians arrive first on scene. Critics invoking “militarization” miss the point: unpreparedness already cost blood. The current risk involves uneven standards, maintenance, and ongoing funding across jurisdictions.

Israel and the World**Britain's Maccabi Affair Exposes A Democratic Nerve**

UK handling of the Maccabi Tel Aviv match shifted from embarrassment to institutional stress test. Parliamentary scrutiny revealed police leadership barred Israeli fans on “safety” grounds while intentionally withholding intelligence indicating credible threats from local elements—threats serious enough to change the calculus entirely. The result was banning the targets of intimidation rather than those planning it, followed by partial admissions, reputational damage, and mounting resignation calls across political lines. Parallel incidents—such as Manchester's Holocaust memorial destruction—show identical patterns, treating antisemitism as a public-order inconvenience until it becomes a hate-inspired attack framed as a communications problem. This isn't a political issue but a rule-of-law issue.

ASSESSMENT

Democracies deteriorate when authorities preemptively restrict lawful participation instead of enforcing against criminal intimidation. The UK possessed tools but lacked will. This represents controlled surrender, not crowd control. The remedy involves disclosing threat intelligence to decision-makers, enforcing laws against those threatening violence, and ceasing to launder fear into “safety assessments.”

From Editorial Desks To Shop Floors

Across the West, antisemitism sheds taboos. A major Spanish newspaper framed a U.S. federal judge as impartial “despite being Jewish,” then quietly edited

the line—admission without accountability. New York’s official data show Jews remain the hate-crime target majority, prompting state-level protection measures as municipal leadership reviews synagogue protest limits. Manchester saw a Holocaust memorial smashed and dumped. In workplaces, activism crossed the line: employees at a Jewish-owned bakery organized labor demands explicitly prohibiting Jewish cultural expression and Israel-tied charitable support, rebranding Jew-hate as ethical labor politics.

ASSESSMENT

Identity becomes recast as liability, then regulated. This isn’t vague disagreement with Israeli policies or politics but conditioning civic and economic participation on disavowing Jewish identity or ties. When identity becomes presumptive bias, equal citizenship loses footing. Editors edit, city halls equivocate, employers face pressure to purge, and police manage optics. Excused hate inevitably metastasizes into violence.

Allies Act, Adversaries Reveal Themselves

Alignment hardens away from theatrics. Israel deepened security and political ties with Japan through senior parliamentary engagement, expanded diplomatic footprint with new embassies planned in Jerusalem by Pacific partners, and prepared Latin American reset as a conservative Honduran president-elect scheduled pre-inaugural Jerusalem visit. Concurrently, detailed analysis traced state-tolerated antisemitism rise in China to strategic anti-U.S. alignment and cheap Middle Eastern partner signaling—intentional, institutional hostility.

ASSESSMENT

Briefly Noted

Diplomacy & Geopolitics

- The US brokered a new Israel-Syria framework in Paris including security coordination and a proposed demilitarized economic zone around Mount Hermon pitched as “Zermatt-style” ski resort development. Washington tests whether economics can stabilize a border ideology and militias couldn’t. Israel maintains security primacy while others fantasize about après-ski peace.
- Egyptian officials signal de facto Camp David recalibration, citing Israel’s Philadelphi Corridor control as a breach.

- The Trump administration announced plans withdrawing the US from 66 international organizations deemed hostile to American interests, stripping funding from bureaucracies converting process into constraint—quietly benefiting Israel by shrinking hostile venues.

Frontline & Security

- Heavy fighting erupted in Aleppo between Syrian government forces and Kurdish SDF units, displacing over 46,000 civilians after evacuation orders and shelling.

Economy, Tech & Infrastructure

- Israel completed a \$6 billion dollar-bond offering with demand six times oversubscribed and spreads back to pre-war levels. Markets price Israeli risk as manageable—undercutting boycott rhetoric with hard capital flows.

Culture, Religion & Society

- A former volunteer described systematic martyrdom glorification at a Palestinian summer camp, echoed by polling showing broad armed jihadist group support and disarmament rejection. Peace talks prove pointless when death-cult pedagogy becomes normalized childhood education.
- New US data shows Qatar funneled \$6.6 billion into American universities, with Cornell as top recipient. This money explains why elite campuses produce Hamas apologists and Jew-haters while claiming “academic freedom.”

Developments to Watch

Northern Front (Lebanon / Syria)

- **Aerial Unit Attrition Continues** — The IDF eliminated a second Jouaiyya operative within 48 hours while the LAF again declared the south disarmed.
- **Lebanese Disarmament Claims Diverge** — Beirut publicly insists south-of-Litani clarity while Israeli targeting keeps finding armed crews and infrastructure in place. The gap invites outside demands for Israeli restraint based on fiction—accelerating miscalculation rather than stability.

Gaza & Southern Theater

- **Zeitoun Search Resumes** — Coordination restarted in Zeitoun to locate Ran Gvili’s remains, with Hamas and PIJ involved under Red Cross cover.
- **Northern Strip Fire Under Ceasefire** — Hamas fired on IDF forces in the north and faced a precise strike on a senior operator advancing attacks.

Regional Axis (Iran, Houthis, Militias)

- **Missile-Centric Deterrence Signaling** — Tehran publicly elevates ballistic missiles as primary deterrent amid unrest, pairing drills with language justifying preemption if “tangible signs” appear. **LIKELY TO ESCALATE**
- **Iraqi Militias Cross the Line** — Reporting indicates ~800 Iran-backed Iraqi fighters deployed to suppress protests inside Iran under “pilgrimage” cover. Externalizing repression signals regime stress and raises odds Tehran exports fear when domestic control frays. **LIKELY TO ESCALATE**
- **Atlantic Interdiction Friction** — U.S. forces boarded an Iran-linked, Russian-flagged tanker with RAF maritime escort as Moscow warned Washington to stop pursuit.
- **Allies Signal Evacuation Risk** — Australia upgraded Iran to “Do Not Travel,” with others urging departures as protests intensify. Embassy drawdowns compress decision time and reduce buffers if Tehran lashes out.

Diplomatic & Legal

- **Machash Relocation Advances** — The government moved a bill shifting Police Internal Investigations out of the State Attorney’s Office.

Home Front & Politics

- **Negev Governance Operation Scales** — The prime minister launched a police-led, multi-agency push to restore order in the Negev, citing merged criminal and security threats.
- **Community Defense Standardization** — Nationwide Arad rifle distribution with standardized, advanced optics to civilian rapid-response teams is complete. This hard-codes first-response capacity ahead of the next surprise—but uneven training or maintenance will surface quickly if tested.
- **Storm Stress-Test Imminent** — A severe winter system forecast includes gale-force winds, dangerous seas, and flash-flood risk.

Watch for three stress tests: Hezbollah deciding whether to answer aerial attrition with a “manageable” incident. Gaza actors turning the Zeitoun search into leverage or humiliation theater. And Tehran, under internal strain, reaching for an external pressure valve—missiles, proxies, or intimidation.
